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# from Our New Ministry Chair

#### Christ is in our midst!

I am honored to humbly begin serving as your Ministry Chair, and I look forward to the next two years, building up our ministry, reflecting and growing in Christ. I wish to thank Kay Harkins, our previous Chair, for all the work that she has done in changing the culture and creating a foundation that is truly ministry-based. I also want to thank Vasiliki Kyriakakis for her efforts in creating communication links and building those contacts and relationships between parishes and the Leadership Circle.

I want to welcome both Ross Ritterman and Sam Herron to our Leadership Circle as the new Church Music Development Team Leaders. It takes time, effort, and ownership to help the ministry run smoothly, and these gentlemen have dedicated themselves to improving our ministry, building resources, and developing relationships with those parishes needing support restoring their music programs.

On September 24<sup>th</sup>, we had a wonderful Church Music Intensive workshop at Holy Trinity, investigating the development of congregational singing in the Orthodox Church, showing examples of where parishes have active congregational singing in their parishes, and introducing music to create a beautiful experience that encourages active congregational worship. As Ross Ritterman reminded us in his segment of the workshop, even the antiphons are a dogmatic statement and their inclusion and where they were placed in the Divine Liturgy was intentional and each moment of the liturgy has it purpose in bringing us into unity with Christ.

Therefore, my challenge to all of us, *myself first and foremost*, is this: if we are addressing God through our talent, then we need to truly understand what it is we are saying, praying, and singing. If we are just singing pretty words and hoping that the melodies inspire the congregation without knowing what's behind the meaning, is our sacrifice of praise really a sacrifice? Our clergy encourage us to partake in the sacraments on a regular basis, but our own preparation is required.

Let us then, as church musicians, go further in our preparations to lead the congregations in worship. We must reflect on the reasons we call Psalm 103 at the beginning of vespers the Psalm of Creation, why the Resurrectional Evlogaitaria is sung in Orthros, and why the troparia changes for memorials and funerals. When we warm up our voices early in the morning and come, attend, and worship during Orthros, it is because we recognize that the liturgical services of our church are an ongoing dialogue between God, the clergy, the musicians, and the congregation, and whatever is being sung by our choirs is essential to the continuation of the heavenly dialogue.


Finally, we should be active in our church at home as well. If we want our children, grandchildren, and families to sing with us, we should take the opportunity to learn the hymns of the Great Feasts and saints with our loved ones together and sing them an a daily basis. When we get together with friends and families for dinners and parties, we can pray a Compline or a Paraklesis together. Our future generations will learn the hymns of the church only with *multiple exposures and repetition*.

I stand ready to serve our ministry to the best of my capacity, and support our teams to help wherever we can to offer guidance on how to reengage and develop our music ministries. Only together, with lots of work, can we grow our programs by truly offering a sacrifice of praise.

May the intercessions of St. Romanos and St. John Koukouzelis be with us as we serve Christ.

Each year in concurrence with Church Music Sunday, always observed on the first Sunday in October, the National Forum of Greek Orthodox Church Musicians honors those choir directors who have served in their Metropolises for over 25 years. This year, Ms. Kathy Loukatos Meck was presented with the Patriarch Athenagoras Medallion for Distinguished Metropolis Service, a special letter of commendation from Arcibishop Elpidophoros, and recognition in the National Forum's yearly Liturgical Guidebook for her role in directing choirs in the Metropolis of San Francisco. As a beautiful surprise, Father John Karitotakis, former proistamenos of Saint Sypyridon was on hand on October 2 to help present her Patriarch Athenagoras Medallion.

Kathy has been directing choirs in our Metropolis beginning in 1991 at Assumption Long Beach and at Saint Spyridon San Diego since 2004.
