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# The Revival of

n Parishes

Across the Metropolis, a quiet revival is taking place in parishes: the practice of holding vigils for the celebration of major feasts or special saints. These vigils are liturgical ways that we literally stay awake, praying, and watching for Christ - the Bridegroom who is coming in the middle of the night. These vigils have gained traction as a means of deepening spiritual engagement. They also provide a way for church musicians from surrounding parishes to gather together to complete the long journey of chanting a full vigil.

Vigils offer the perfect opportunity to deepen our connection with the feast or saint that are being celebrated. In this context, a "vigil" constitutes the celebration of Vespers, Orthros, and Divine Liturgy as one continuous liturgical experience. Typically, these include longer versions of hymns, hymns that are omitted, and additional readings of psalms



or patristic texts. During a vigil, worshippers, musicians, and celebrants are literally immersed in the "subject" of the vigil. By listening to some of the hymns we do not normally hear in our parishes (e.g., canons, the lity, etc.) the feast or the saint really comes to life!



The significance of vigilance in spiritual practice finds its roots in the very teachings of Christ Himself. In Holy Week, before His crucifixion, we will hear Jesus implore His disciples in the garden of Gethsemane to "stay awake and pray" to avoid temptation. This call to vigilance, to be ever alert and attentive to the presence of our Lod, resonates deeply within the Christian journey.

Parishioners participating in vigils find themselves immersed in an atmosphere of prayer, contemplation, and reflection. Much like the disciples in the garden, they commit to keeping watch, allowing themselves to be drawn closer to the mysteries of the Faith. Through extended periods of communal prayer, they seek to emulate Christ's example of vigilance.

In addition to fostering spiritual growth and community bonding, these vigils serve as a reminder of the transformative power of faith. Beyond mere acts of devotion, the Christian journey beckons believers to enter into a deeper communion with God. One of the minimiracles that many people experience during a vigil is the experience of "liturgical time". Vigils typically last 7 or more hours. After the end, with the conclusion of the Divine Liturgy, many people remark "Wow! I can't believe that went by so fast!" Truly, it is a mystery how these seemingly long journeys go by so quickly.

As the trend of vigils continues to gain momentum, it revitalizes parish life and invigorates the Orthodox Christian experience. In the stillness of the night, amidst flickering candlelight and hymns, the faithful find comfort, inspiration, and renewal on their path towards the Kingdom of Heaven.
